Greenwood native publishes fifth children's book

o matter what, Rody the Rooster just wouldn't do what he was supposed to.

When Jude and his family buy a chicken and a rooster, they expect the end result will be plenty of fresh eggs in no time. Little did they know that Rody wouldn't make things that easy. In the end, though, it's a surprise twist that changes the whole story for expression.

"That big surprise helps Jude help eople in need in his town," author

Jodi Scheve said.

Scheve, a Greenwood native, tells this unusual story in her newest children's book, "Jude & Rody the Rooster." The story, which covers the trials of raising chickens compined with the importance of beli bined with the importance of helping others, is her fifth book, further show-casing her ability to weave important childhood and life skills such as learning the alphabet, counting to 100 and recognizing shapes with quaint and quirty plots

and quirky plots.

To create the book, she teamed up with her former classmate at Greenwood Community High School, Kristina Dougan, who illustrated it. The end result is a colorful and fun tale that builds on early childhood education as well.

"Every book has a teaching lesson in it," she said. "There's a lot of thought process that goes into the book, it's not just a story. I try to teach them a little bit too."

Scheve's entrance into children's

book was born out of necessity. When her son Ritchie was 3 years old, she was searching for a good book that would teach him his ABCs

But she couldn't find one that showed both uppercase and lowercase letters

"So I decided, I'll just write my own book," she said.

The result was "The Cow Jumped Over the ABCs," which followed the adventures of a leaping cow while covering the different letters of the alphabet. That initial release was so enjoyable that Scheve went on to

write three more. "The Sand Crabs Journey Home" helps kids count to 100, illustrated trying to get home to their parents. "Richie Saves Nashville" tells the story of a boy named Richie, who

makes the biggest candle anyone has ever seen to save his hometown of Nashville.


